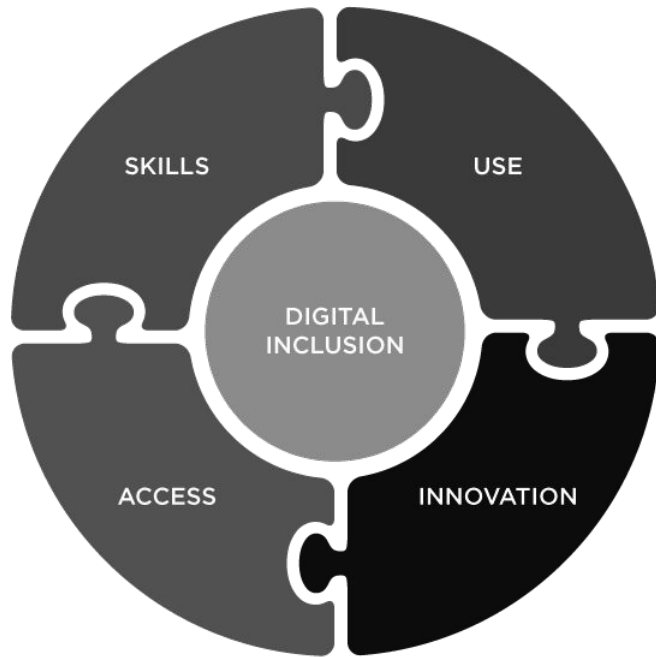

Digital Inclusion is defined as “equitable, meaningful, and safe access to use, lead, and design of digital technologies, services and associated opportunities for everyone, everywhere.

Synergy

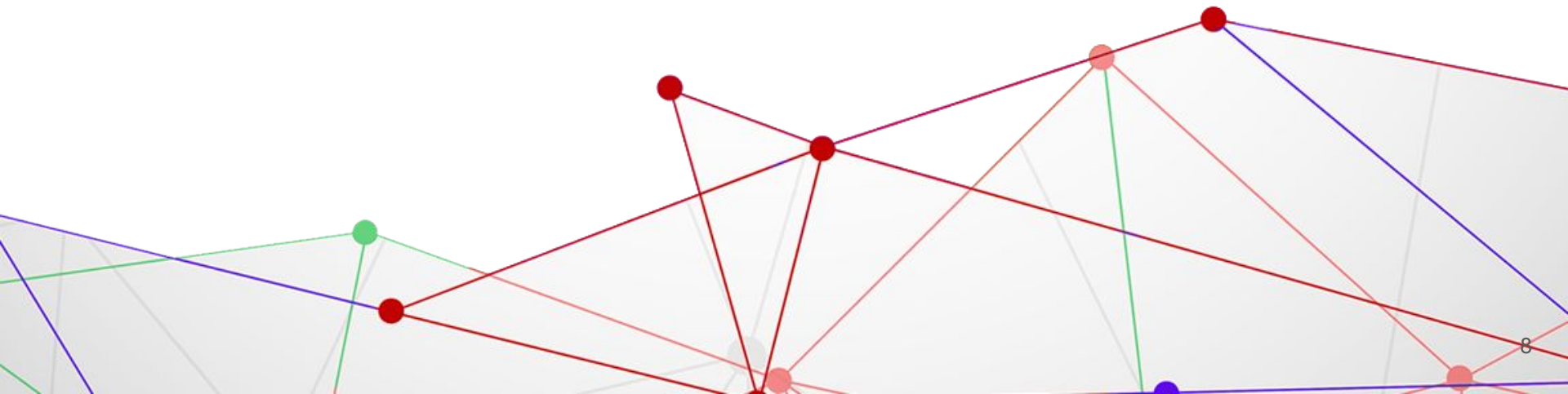

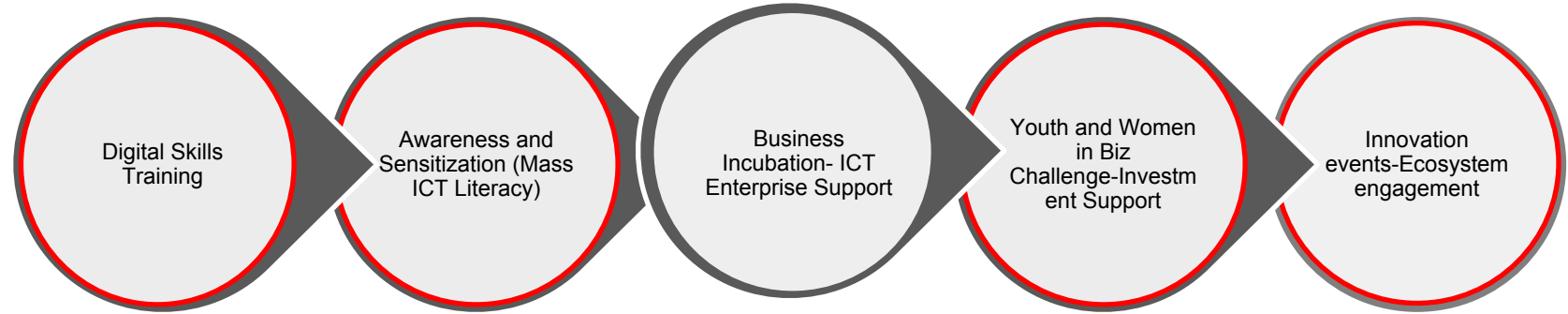
Target Beneficiaries:

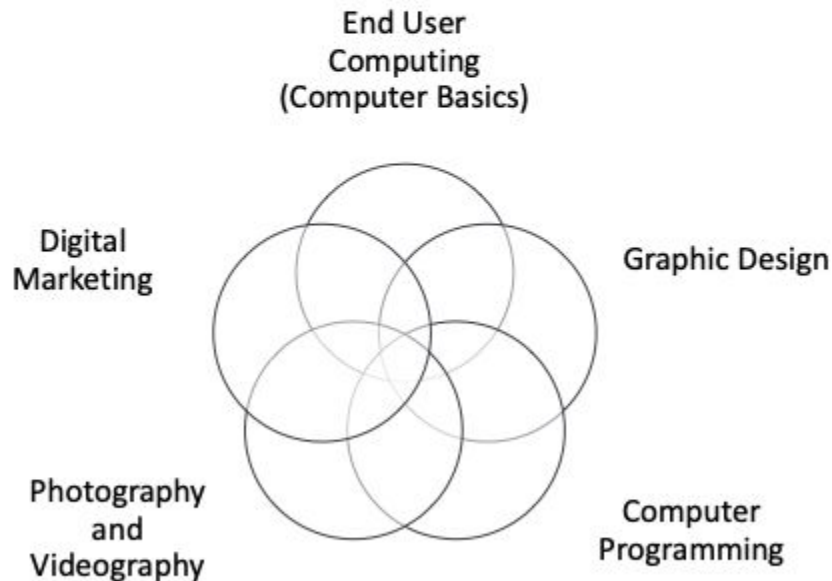

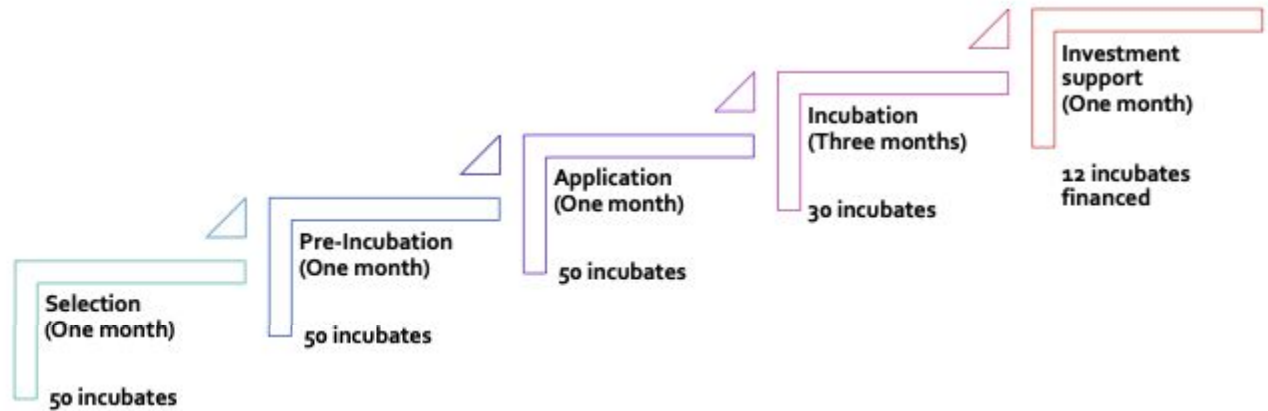
MILE Overview



Digital Skills Training Curriculum

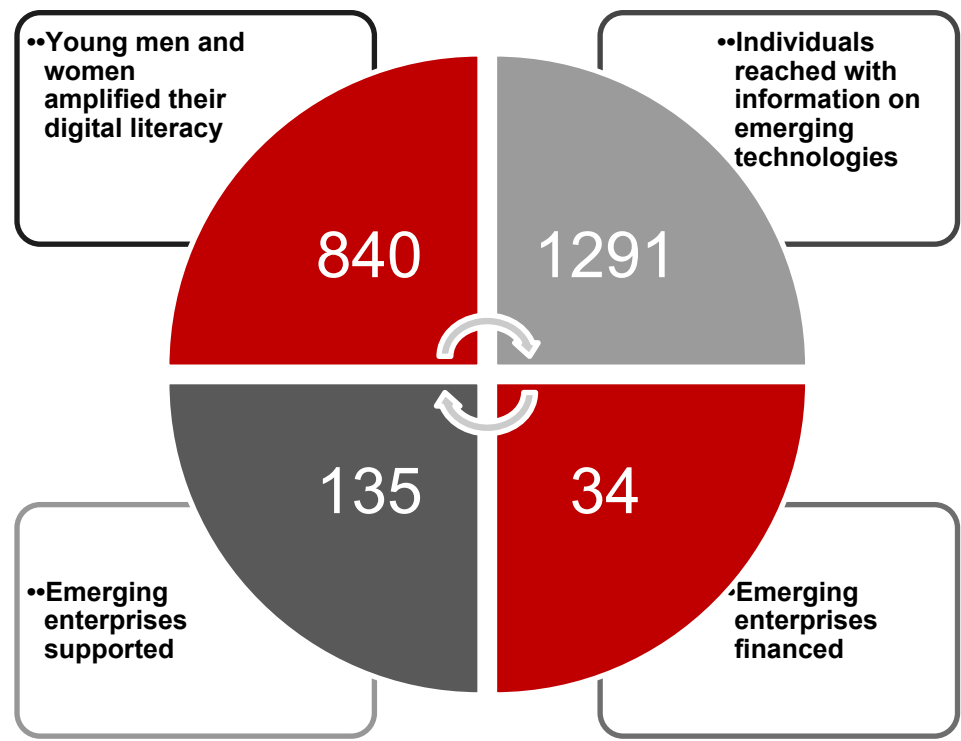


Duration: 12 weeks

It's not always rosy: Gaps encountered

Digital Access and Infrastructure

Having worked across all districts in Northern Malawi, lack of digital access and available infrastructure ie resource hubs where they can access information and skills posed a big challenge

Affordability of digital technologies

Rural community dwellers mostly live in poverty and the cost of maintaining digital technologies for their household is way out of reach. Some are able to buy a cheap cell phone but mostly not able to afford mobile data

Logistics can get chaotic

One encounter in Likoma whilst disembarking the computers, one fell and broke. Not exactly what we needed at the time!

Digital Motivation and Interest

Adoption and participation in the digital realm required adopting different approaches that would motivate and interest the rural community dwellers. If it's not interesting, we do not need it!

Key lessons learnt

Collaboration is vital at different levels of implementation - Design to Implementation

Follow up program activities are an added value to beneficiaries- Think Sustainability!

Industry linkages ie apprenticeships, internships, learning visits contributed a lot towards exposure to the beneficiaries

Certification through TEVETA provided a level of recognition

Recommendations

Access to digital literacy training through resource hubs, schools

Affordability-robust internet service, equipment

Participation- Digital exclusion should be a topic of discussion

Internet enabled devices or services that meet the needs of the user

Quality technical support to emerging startups/enterprises

Anyone can support a digitally inclusive community – including you; it's easy!
